It is with regret that I am rescinding my nomination for Department President for the 2025-2026 Administrative Year. This decision was not made lightly. Sometimes life circumstances create a situation where focus and care need to be redirected, and this is what has recently happened.

As some of you know, my father-in-law is currently on hospice and only has a few months left on this earth. When he leaves this place to join our creator, we will be moving my mother-in-law in with us. I will be working with her through her grief, helping her set up a trust that is revocable while she lives, that becomes irrevocable afterwards with checks and balances in place to ensure the continued medical care for Doug's sister who suffered from 9 aneurisms back in 2020, who is completely unable to care for herself. We will also be helping my MIL in disposing of accumulated assets from a 50 yr. marriage and helping her prep and sell their home, transferring what she designates into the trust that will be set up for Karen. This is going to take a great deal of time and effort to help my MIL navigate as well as helping her get established socially in a new town and processing her grief.

Knowing this is on the quickly approaching horizon, I must think what is best for our Department and the Organization as a whole. I have talked through this with two of my mentors and as difficult as it is, I honestly do not think that this is a good time for me to run for Department President, knowing that my bandwidth will already be stretched given the upcoming loss we will be experiencing as well as protecting my MIL from the vultures that are beginning to surface, knowing full well we are getting closer to my FIL's passing.

I do intend, at some point, to run for Department President. It could be next year, in a couple years, etc. but at this time, and under these circumstances, I truly believe in my heart that I am not the best choice at this time for our Department in the manner it truly needs. I pray everyone understands, this was a very difficult decision, nor was it lightly made.

I want to express that this has NOTHING to do with the Auxiliary as a whole, or any rumored problems within the Department of Kansas Auxiliary. I spoke to Pam Ray, incoming National President for 2025-2026, as I did not want her assuming anything negative about our Department based on my withdraw from the election. After explaining my situation, she was thankful I communicated with her as she honestly would have questioned the withdrawal. Please know that I love the ALA Department of Kansas and I will stay involved, assisting and mentoring in any way that I can as time allows. I had to be realistic on my proposed bandwidth to fulfill the requirements of our highest position, so for the sake of protecting my career, continued good health, my family, and the success of the Department of Kansas, I need to withdraw my candidacy for Department President.

Thank you for always supporting, mentoring, and challenging me. I truly am blessed to be surrounded by amazing members and continue to be inspired with what our members achieve. As I have stated, this is not 'never', it is just a 'not-right-now' for the good of the Organization.
